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Ipswich Store Staff Outing, 1930s

During the 1930s staff at Marks & Spencer enjoyed a range of social activities from sports days to trips to the theatre. Here the staff at Ipswich are just about to set off on a day trip in a charabanc. The group might have been heading for the Suffolk Coast. Lots of the women in the photo are wearing cloche hats, the man on the right wears a smart trench coat.






Marksman Spitfire, 1940s

Staff at M&S raised £5,000 for the presentation to the nation of a Spitfire Fighter Aircraft. It was named The Marksman, in tribute to those who donated to the cause. The aeroplane was flown by Sergeant 'Tommy' Rigler who shot down three enemy fighters in one day in June 1941.





Marks & Spencer Ambulance

As well as raising money for a Spitfire, staff at Head Office also raised money for a Red Cross Ambulance. If you look closely at the photograph you can see printed on the side 'Presented by the Head Office Staff of Marks and Spencer Ltd'. We don't know where this ambulance was used, but many Red Cross ambulances were driven by volunteers who helped people affected by bombing in the UK.





St Michael News, September 1955

This front cover of the M&S staff magazine shows three ladies boarding a British European Airways plane. One lady holds onto her hat as a helicopter approaches. St Michael News was a magazine for all employees of M&S – the edition gave a preview of the new range of womenswear for Autumn 1955.





Stepney Green Warehouse, 1950s

During the 1950s this warehouse in Stepney Green, London, was where fruit sold at M&S was packed and distributed. This photograph shows a busy day at the warehouse, with lorries parked outside being unloaded. We don't know what the make and model of these trucks was, but Leyland, Bedford and Commer were all common commercial vehicles in the 1950s.






Preston, 1958

This photograph shows a busy street in Preston. Marks & Spencer can be seen on the right-hand side, the department store Owen Owen is on the left. The vehicle at the front of the photo looks like a Morris Traveller. Popular cars at the time included the Ford Anglia, Ford Popular, and the Hillman Minx.






J&P Jacobs' Bedford Van, 1960

This photographs shows a Bedford delivery van. The van was owned by The Jacobs Group of sewing factories. Jacobs manufactured garments for M&S and delivered them directly to stores. The van carries the M&S brand name 'St Michael'. Jacobs had factories in the north of England including St Helens, Bradford and Liverpool.






Fashion Shoot, Spring 1965

This advert for M&S menswear and womenswear features four models and their adventures around Devon in a Dormobile. The women wear dresses in Tricel and Crimplene, the man wears a terylene shirt and trousers. The Bedford Dormobile was a popular campervan in the 1960s.





July 1969

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






Young St Michael advert, 1970


This leaflet promoted a new range of clothing aimed at young men. The range was introduced in 1970 and promised 'Trendy styles for all'. The models stand by a racing car, likely to be a Formula Ford 1600.



History of Cars, 1977

This book on the history of cars was sold at M&S in 1977, it features a Bentley in classic racing green. The foreword is by racing driver James Hunt who had won the Formula One World Championship in 1976.





Car Care, 1979

This book, featuring a Ford Cortina with its bonnet open, gives readers helpful advice on car care. During the 1970s and 1980s M&S sold non-fiction books on lots of subjects including cooking and baking, make-up, toymaking and baby-care. This book includes chapters on paint repairs, starter motors, cooling systems and electrical components.





Brent Cross Goods Entrance, 1983

This photograph shows the goods entrance at M&S in Brent Cross. A large refrigerated lorry has reversed up to the loading bay for warehouse staff to unload. Parked in the car park are cars including a Rover, Ford Cortina and a Talbot Sunbeam.

HELPING W.V.S.





In spite of the intense cold, the two sales assistants from Brixton store worked on the W.V.S. canteen. Three management trainees, Michael Bonner, Richard Dixon, and Lawrence Robinson helped unload supply lorries and did much heavy work. Well done, Brixton!

Churchill's Funeral, January 1965

This cutting shows Lily and Cynthia, staff at Brixton store in the 1960s. They both volunteered with the Women's Voluntary Service in their spare time, and in 1965 the WVS served hot drinks to queues of people visiting the lying-in-state of Winston Churchill. Churchill passed away on 24th January 1965, and the lying-in-state lasted from Wednesday 27th January to 6:00 am on 30th January.
